H. Symbolum Electorum. This is a collection of Gerald's favourite compositions. The full version, of which only one manuscript exists, contained four parts: letters, poems, selections from the *Top*. and Exp., prefaces. The letters all date from before 1199 and no excerpts are included from works known to have been written after the St. David's case, 1199-1203. It seems defensible to assign the compilation of the Symbolum Electorum to c. 1199, just before the cause célebre diverted Gerald's energies from literary activity. If this is the case, we have a valuable guide to his existing opus c.1199. This includes the Irish and Welsh works, Vita Galf., the saints lives (except the Vita Hug.), and the Gemma. There is no problem in dating any of these to before 1199. The only doubt which might be raised springs from the inclusion in the Symbolum *Electorum* of all four prefaces from the *De Princtpis Instructione*. However, although the text of the Prin. as we now have it dates from c.1217, Gerald worked on it for many years and there is no compelling objection to the existence of a complete, short draft of all three books c.1199. The passage in the 'Praefatio Prima' (Inc. 'De principis instructione tractatum edere...') which refers to Prince Louis and was probably written in 1216-17 (Prin., pp. 6-7), is absent from the Symbolum Electorum text of the preface.
